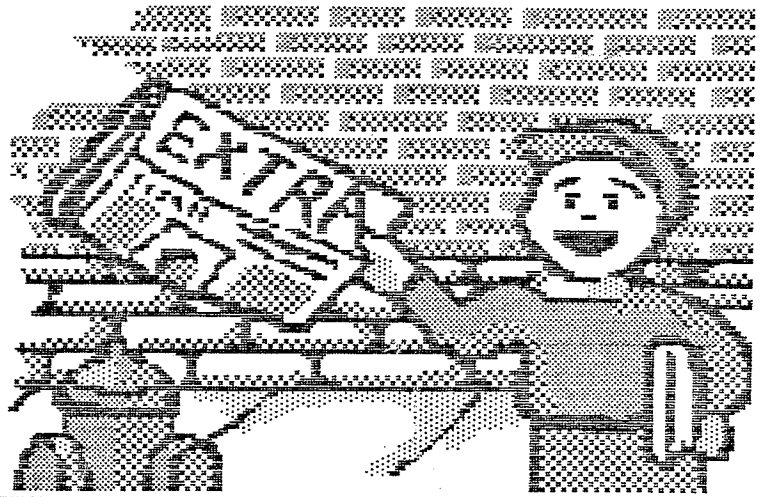


THE MT. WOLF HOWLER

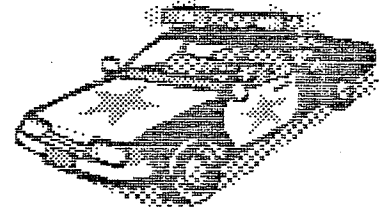

FROM YOUR POLICE DEPARTMENT:



In an effort to keep crime at a minimum, it is important for the citizens of any community to become involved. Mt. Wolf is not immune to crime and the North-eastern Regional Police suggest the following tips as a way you can become involved. What to look for:

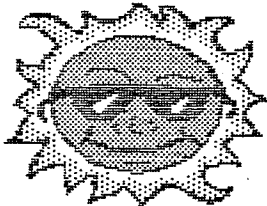
- Your neighbors are on vacation, but there is a window open on the ground floor.
- There is a strange car parked in an alley or in front of a home with the motor running.
- People selling "dirt cheap" from their car.
- A stranger knocks on the front door then walks around back.
- You are awakened by a loud noise or barking dog. Dogs will usually bark at people walking or "sneaking" past them.

Above all...please don't think a call to 911 is "dumb" or "trivial". If you see something suspicious, call 911 and report it. That is why the Police are there. Become involved in your community. Help a neighbor. Someday you may need help.

More from the Police:

Note.. enclosed in this newsletter is a vacation check form. If you are planning a vacation, fill this out and drop it off at the Police Office and the officer will make a daily check of your property.

Don't forget...Stop your papers or have them put in your home, put lights and radio on timer, and have someone move your car around daily so it appears it is being used.

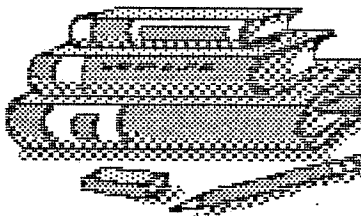

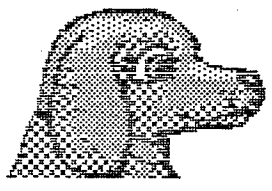
ORDINANCE HIGHLIGHTS -

IT'S THE LAW.....



#1986-3 - Dog & Cat Ordinance

They are not permitted to run at large in the Borough except on owner's premises; they must be kept on a leash and/or under control of a person able to control them; they cannot habitually howl, bark, whine, yelp or cry so that it



disturbs the peace and the owner is required to remove any excreta when deposited on public or private property other than their own. Penalty - not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$300.

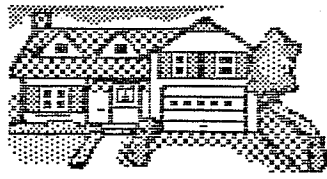
#119 - Requires sidewalks, streets and alleys to be kept clear of foliage. Sidewalks: bushes protruding onto sidewalks or low hanging branches so as to cause obstruction to intended use of sidewalks must be trimmed (7 feet height). **Streets & Alleys:** Must be kept clear for entire width and to a height of 13 feet. Penalty: \$15.00 fine plus cost to Borough to have removed.

#126 - Weed Ordinance - property owners are responsible for controlling weeds on their property up to and including the curb line to a height no higher than 9 inches. Penalty: \$15.00 fine plus cost of Borough to remove.

#155 - Curfew Ordinance - No one under 18 is permitted upon the streets, alleys, parks or public places after 11:00 PM Sunday through Thursday and midnight on Friday and Saturday. Penalty - summary offense.

#181 - Park Ordinance - No alcoholic beverages, no bike riding, no glass bottles, no abusive or vulgar language, no firearms, no fireworks, and no destruction of property in Borough parks. Penalty - not to exceed \$300.00.

#1985-6 - No Burning in the Borough. Penalty - fine not to exceed \$300.00.

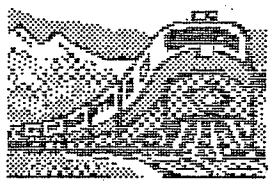


#1977-3 - House numbering -

All buildings used as dwelling or businesses in the Borough shall be numbered and display that number so that it is visible from the street. (Not less than 3 inches in size). Penalty - not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$300.00.

A BIT OF HISTORY:

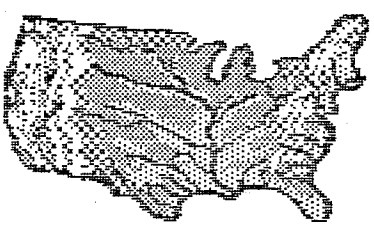
In June, 1863, Confederate troops on their way to burn the railroad bridge over the Conewago stopped at George Wolf's store and paid in confederate money for boots, hats and clothing.



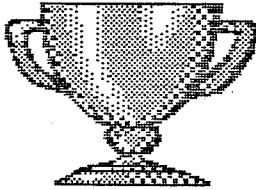
The railroad running through Mt. Wolf carried thousands of boys to fight in the Civil War on troop trains.

In 1885 there were 50 buildings and approximately 200 persons living in Mt. Wolf.

In the early 1900's there were over 30 businesses in little Mt. Wolf!



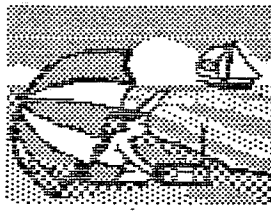
